## How the Survey was Conducted

## Nature of the Sample: NBC News/WSJ/Marist Iowa Poll of 3,040 Adults

This survey of 3,040 adults was conducted January 24<sup>th</sup> through January 26<sup>th</sup>, 2016 by The Marist Poll sponsored and funded in partnership with NBC News and The Wall Street Journal. Adults 18 years of age and older residing in the state of Iowa were interviewed in English by telephone using live interviewers. Landline telephone numbers were randomly selected based upon a list of telephone exchanges from throughout the state of Iowa from ASDE Survey Sampler, Inc. The exchanges were selected to ensure that each region was represented in proportion to its population. Respondents in the household were randomly selected by first asking for the youngest male. To increase coverage, this landline sample was supplemented by respondents reached through random dialing of cell phone numbers from Survey Sampling International. Both samples were matched by telephone number to a voter registration list for the state. Voter information was appended to each matched case. Assistance was provided by Luce Research for data collection and L2 for voter registration information. After the interviews were completed, the two samples were then combined and balanced to reflect the 2013 American Community Survey 5-year estimates for age, gender, income, and race, except for region, which is from the 2010 census. Results are statistically significant within ±1.8 percentage points. There are 2,791 registered voters. The results for this subset are statistically significant within ±1.9 percentage points. Among registered voters, 1.172 had a phone match in the voter file and 1.619 did not. The results for each of these subsets is statistically significant within ±2.9 percentage points and ±2.4 percentage points, respectively. There are 1,079 voters in the potential Republican caucus electorate. The potential Republican caucus electorate in Iowa includes all voters who prefer to participate in the Republican presidential caucus and registered Republicans without a caucus preference. There are 1,020 voters in the potential Democratic caucus electorate. The potential Democratic caucus electorate includes all voters who prefer to participate in the Democratic presidential caucus and registered Democrats without a caucus preference. The results for these subsets are statistically significant within ±3.0 percentage points and ±3.1 percentage points, respectively. There are 450 likely Republican caucus-goers and 426 likely Democratic caucus-goers defined by a probability turnout model which determines the likelihood respondents will participate in the 2016 Iowa Republican/Democratic Presidential Caucus based upon their chance of vote, interest in the election, and past election participation. The results for these subsets are statistically significant within ±4.6 percentage points and ±4.7 percentage points, respectively. The error margin was not adjusted for sample weights and increases for cross-tabulations.
