## McClatchy-Marist Poll National Survey October 8, 2010

## Nature of the Sample: 1,030 U.S. Residents

This survey of 1,030 United States residents was conducted on September 30<sup>th</sup> through October 5<sup>th</sup>. Residents 18 years of age and older were interviewed by telephone. Telephone numbers were selected based upon a list of telephone exchanges from throughout the nation. The exchanges were selected to ensure that each region was represented in proportion to its population. To increase coverage, this land-line sample was supplemented by respondents reached through random dialing of cell phone numbers. The two samples were then combined. Results are statistically significant within ±3.0 percentage points. There are 829 registered voters. The results for this subset are statistically significant within ±3.5 percentage points. The error margin increases for cross-tabulations.
