Democratic Presidential Primary 2008

- **Hillary Clinton's lead narrows among likely Democratic primary voters:** Hillary Clinton's once commanding lead over her Democratic rivals for the 2008 New Hampshire Democratic Presidential Primary has been nearly halved. Last month, Clinton led her closest competitor, Barack Obama, by 21 percentage points. Now, the gap has narrowed to just 11 percentage points. 36% of likely Democratic presidential primary voters support Senator Clinton followed by 25% for Senator Obama. Former Senator John Edwards receives 14%. The remaining candidates, Governor Bill Richardson, Congressman Dennis Kucinich, Senator Joe Biden, Senator Chris Dodd, and former Senator Mike Gravel trail with single digit support.*

- What's changed?** Although Hillary Clinton has seen a decline in support among many groups within New Hampshire's likely Democratic Primary electorate, one of the biggest changes has been among men forty-five years of age and older. Last month, she led both Barack Obama and John Edwards by 20 percentage points among this group. It is now a three-way contest. In a turnabout from last month's poll, Obama now leads Clinton by 13 percentage points among first time voters. He trailed Clinton by 19 percentage points among first time voters in the earlier poll. Nearly one in five likely Democratic primary voters has never before voted in New Hampshire's Democratic primary.

- Intensity of Support:** Overall, 56% of likely New Hampshire Democratic Presidential Primary voters strongly support a candidate for their party's nomination for president. 64% of likely voters who back Hillary Clinton say they are strongly committed to her. In contrast, 49% of likely voters who support Barack Obama, and 46% who back John Edwards say they strongly support their candidate.

- Second Choice:** The top three Democratic candidates are also the second choice of many likely Democratic presidential primary voters. 22% will opt for John Edwards and 21% will choose Hillary Clinton if they do not end up voting for their current first choice. 19% say Barack Obama is their second choice for the presidential nomination.

The Democratic Primary Electorate

- The Voters' Agenda:** Bringing about change, being a strong leader, being close on the issues, and sharing values are important to likely New Hampshire Democratic Presidential Primary voters when deciding whom to support. 25% of likely Democratic presidential primary voters want someone who will bring about change, 22% want a strong leader, 21% are looking for a nominee who is closer to them on the issues, and 20% want a person who shares their values. Clinton is the choice among those likely voters who want a strong leader, who are looking for a candidate who is closer to them on the issues, or shares their values. Barack Obama leads among likely voters who want someone who will bring about change.

- The Voters' Priorities:** The war in Iraq, the economy, and health care outdistance other concerns in the minds of likely New Hampshire Democratic Presidential Primary voters. 29% of likely voters cite the war in Iraq as the most important issue followed by 21% who are concerned about the economy, and 20% who mention health care. Among likely voters who see the war in Iraq as the

top issue in this election, Hillary Clinton runs neck and neck with Barack Obama. Clinton draws considerable support from likely voters concerned about the economy and health care.

- **Electability:** 53% of likely Democratic presidential primary voters think Hillary Clinton has the best chance of beating the Republican candidate for president next November.

- **In Touch?** About one third of likely New Hampshire Democratic Presidential Primary voters have seen or met a presidential candidate in person during this campaign.

Republican Presidential Primary 2008

- **Former Governor Romney leads by double digits among likely Republican primary voters:**

Former Governor Mitt Romney leads the field of candidates seeking the Republican presidential nomination. 33% of likely New Hampshire Republican Presidential Primary voters support Romney compared with 22% for former Mayor Rudy Giuliani, and 13% for Senator John McCain. The remaining candidates, Congressman Ron Paul, former Governor Mike Huckabee, former Senator Fred Thompson, Congressman Tom Tancredo, and Congressman Duncan Hunter have only single digit support. †

- **The Candidates’ Supporters:** Governor Romney leads among both Republicans and Republican leaning independent voters. He leads his nearest rival, Rudy Giuliani, by 11 percentage points among likely Republican voters and 13 percentage points among likely Republican leaning independent voters. Romney runs neck and neck against Giuliani among likely Republican women voters and likely Republican voters with a college education.

- Intensity of Support:** 54% of likely Republican presidential primary voters strongly support their candidate. Among the leading Republican candidates, 47% of Mitt Romney’s supporters are firmly committed to him. 21% of his supporters feel they may vote differently on primary day. Similarly, 50% of Giuliani’s voters strongly support him while 18% might vote for another candidate on primary day.

- Second Choice:** Rudy Giuliani and Mitt Romney are the second choice of many likely New Hampshire Republican Presidential Primary voters. 25% of likely voters select Giuliani and 24% support Romney as their second choice. 15% would opt for McCain, and 10% would back Thompson as their runner up.

The Republican Primary Electorate

- The Voters' Agenda:** Strong leadership, shared values, and a candidate's positions on the issues matter most for likely New Hampshire Republican Presidential Primary voters. 30% of likely Republican primary voters want a strong leader compared with 27% who are looking for a candidate who shares their values and 25% who want someone closer to them on the issues. Romney leads his rivals among likely voters who want someone who shares their values or their positions on the issues. He runs competitively with Giuliani among likely Republican primary voters who are looking for a strong leader.

- The Voters' Priorities:** Security from terrorism tops the list of concerns on the minds of likely New Hampshire Republican Presidential Primary voters. 27% of these voters say security from terrorism is the most important issue when deciding their vote for president. 21% cite the economy, 19% find illegal immigration to be the vital issue, and 11% feel the war in Iraq is central to their choice for

president. Mitt Romney is strongest among likely Republican voters concerned most about illegal immigration. Although by a smaller margin, he also leads his Republican rivals among likely primary voters who are concerned about terrorism or the economy.

- Electability:** While Mitt Romney is ahead of his Republican opponents for the primary, likely New Hampshire Republican Presidential Primary voters divide over which Republican is most likely to beat the Democrat next November. 40% of likely primary voters think Giuliani has the greatest potential to be elected president, and 37% think Mitt Romney is most electable.

- In Touch?** One in five likely New Hampshire Republican Presidential Primary voters have already seen or met a candidate in person during the campaign. This compares with 34% of likely Democratic presidential primary voters.

Nature of the Sample: 1,453 New Hampshire Voters

This survey was conducted from November 2nd through November 6th, 2007. 1,453 registered voters and New Hampshire residents who are likely to register in time to vote in the New Hampshire Presidential Primary were interviewed. The sample was selected in proportion to the voter registration in each county in New Hampshire and adjusted for turnout in comparable elections. All interviews were conducted by telephone. There are 658 potential Democratic presidential primary voters including 379 Democrats and 279 Democratic leaning independents. There are 533 potential Republican presidential primary voters including 397 Republicans and 136 Republican leaning independents. The results are statistically significant at $\pm 4\%$ for potential Democratic presidential primary voters and $\pm 4.5\%$ for potential Republican presidential primary voters. There are 458 likely Democratic presidential primary voters and 372 likely Republican presidential primary voters. The results for these sub-samples are statistically significant at $\pm 5\%$ and $\pm 5.5\%$, respectively. The error margin increases for cross-tabulations.
