

## How the Survey was Conducted

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### **Nature of the Sample: PBS NewsHour/Marist Poll of 1,020 National Adults**

This survey of 1,020 adults was conducted February 12<sup>th</sup> through February 18<sup>th</sup>, 2020 by The Marist Poll sponsored in partnership with PBS NewsHour. Adults 18 years of age and older residing in the contiguous United States, including an oversample of African Americans, were contacted on landline or mobile numbers and interviewed in English by telephone using live interviewers. Mobile telephone numbers were randomly selected based upon a list of telephone exchanges from throughout the nation from Dynata. The exchanges were selected to ensure that each region was represented in proportion to its population. Mobile phones are treated as individual devices. After validation of age, personal ownership, and non-business-use of the mobile phone, interviews are typically conducted with the person answering the phone. To increase coverage, this mobile sample was supplemented by respondents reached through random dialing of landline phone numbers. Within each landline household, a single respondent is selected through a random selection process to increase the representativeness of traditionally under-covered survey populations. Assistance was provided by Luce Research for data collection. The samples were then combined and balanced to reflect the 2017 American Community Survey 1-year estimates for age, gender, income, race, and region. Results are statistically significant within  $\pm 3.7$  percentage points. There are 904 registered voters. The results for this subset are statistically significant within  $\pm 3.9$  percentage points. Tables include results for subgroups with a minimum sample size of 100 unweighted completed interviews as to only display crosstabs with an acceptable sampling error. It should be noted that although you may not see results listed for a certain group, it does not mean interviews were not completed with those individuals. It simply means the sample size is too small to report. The error margin was adjusted for sample weights and increases for cross-tabulations.
