How the Survey was Conducted

Methodology: Marist Poll of 3,383 New York City Likely Democratic Primary Voters

This survey of 3,383 likely Democratic primary voters was conducted May 1st through May 8th, 2025 by the Marist Poll. Likely Democratic primary voters were contacted via a multi-mode methodology: By telephone using live interviewers, text to web, or email using sample from the L2 voter file of New York City registered Democrats. All potential respondents were screened for age, residence in New York City, and confirmation of party registration as a Democrat. Survey questions were available in English or Spanish. Samples were randomly selected from the L2 voter file of New York City registered Democrats based on voters' likelihood of participating in the Democratic primary for mayor. The full sample is balanced to age, gender, race, and borough based on the voter registration list information and adjusted for turnout in similar elections. Ranked-choice voting rounds were calculated with assistance from Edison Research.

Results for entire sample of likely Democratic primary voters (n=3,383) are statistically significant within ±2.6 percentage points. The design effect for this survey is 2.38 which has been incorporated in the calculation of all reported margins of error.
